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Message from Senior Management

At **Extractora del Sur de Casanare (ESC)**, the decision to commit to our country means being present and supporting productive development from Villanueva, Casanare, where agroindustry only makes sense if it generates dignified employment, strengthened trust, and creates real opportunities for the territory.

In 2025, we consolidated evidence-based sustainability: We reinforced high standards and certifications such as **RSPO** and **ISCC**, and submitted this report aligned with **GRI** and **GRI 13 - Agriculture**, incorporating Fedepalma’s material indicators and our contribution to the SDGs.

In terms of the environment, we boosted investment by **69%**, reduced diesel consumption by **26.9%**, and advanced the design of a water-footprint management tool. Regarding health and safety in the workplace, we maintain a preventive culture with **98% OHSMS** compliance.

This road is also built with our people and allies, a supply base predominantly composed of small producers, technical assistance, and training for better practices and dialogue spaces with the communities to foster well-being and development. We present these results with the conviction that each improvement and partnership is a concrete way to contribute to Colombia and the future of the territory.

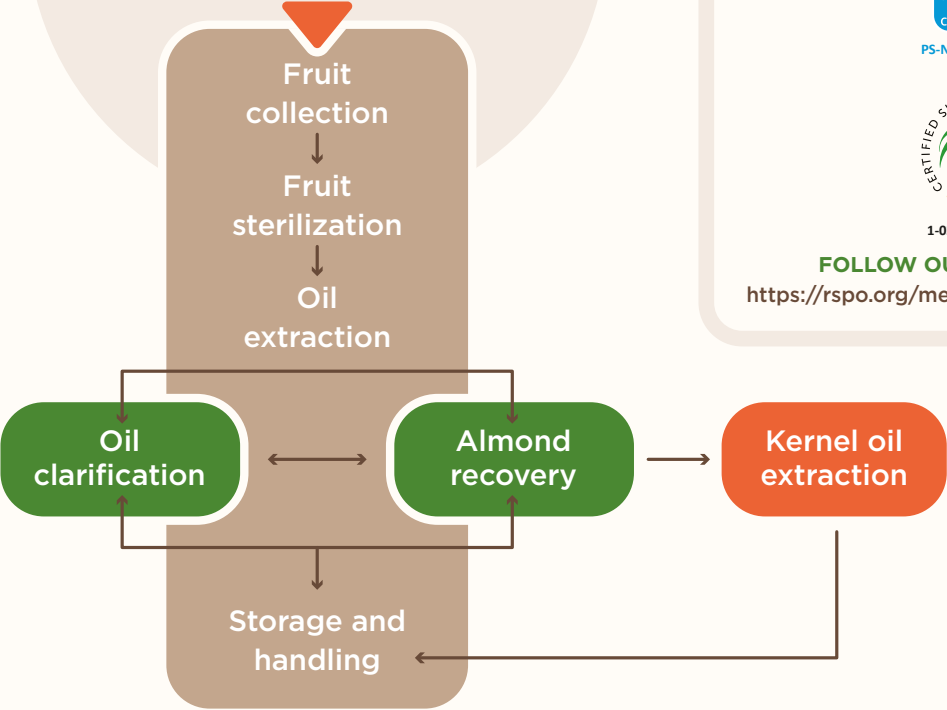

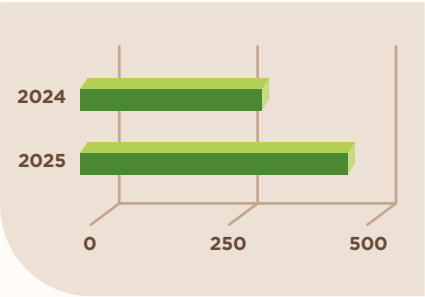

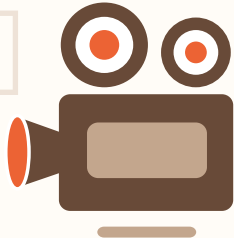

Commitments to Sustainability



Environmental

We are committed to maintaining and promoting, throughout our supply chain, the declared sustainable development principles, and to continually improving efficiency in resource use, waste management, climate mitigation, and environmental care.

In 2026, we have set out to:

- Reduce the amount of water used per ton of processed RFF to 1m³/Ton RFF
- Increase the generation of electric energy with biomass by 70% through the new engine.
- Calculate and monitor the organization's water footprint.
- Design and implement a rainwater harvesting system.



Social

We are committed to maintaining and promoting among our groups of interest the declared sustainable development principles, working in a safe, healthy way, respectfully implementing best practices, and promoting the development of communities.

In 2026, we have set out to:

- Implement the technological package of good agricultural practices across the six established plots in the different subzones.
- Number of hectares with at least 80% of the recommended nutritional plan implemented.
- Promote skill development for the implementation of best sustainability practices.
- Promote good regulatory management practices among oil palm producers.
- Establish pest and disease management practices among 30% of producers in the supply base to improve plant health status.
- Promote the development of skills in human capital among our producers in 2026 through the *Tractor Palmero - Palmero Exitoso* program.



Economic

We are committed to maintaining and promoting among our groups of interest the declared sustainable development principles, implementing the best operational practices, transparency, ethics, and responsibility, and promoting sustainable practices throughout the value chain.

In 2026, we have set out to:

- Achieve an oil extraction rate above 22%, optimizing operational efficiency and maximizing the use of raw materials.
- Increase revenue from palm kernel commercialization by improving almond recovery in the production process.
- Reduce the organization's financial burden by optimizing debt and lowering interest expenses.
- Improve oil quality indicators (acidity) to access better trading conditions and market premiums.
- Maintain unitary production cost under 80USD/tonRFF, strengthening operational efficiency and cost control.
